MOVEMENT - VIVA Events and Updates

Implementation of 'The Awakened Citizens Program (ACP)

A humble beginning of reaching out to a handful of schools in 2013 has become a national movement, resulting in over 6000 schools joining the program. The program has two main components:

- 1. Training of teachers in the selected school, and
- 2. Implementation of the program by the trained teachers.

It is extremely challenging to ensure that the ACP is implemented in its true spirit. Each of our resource persons (RPs) cover 100 schools assigned to him/her. Our relationship with the schools starts after the teachers are trained to run the program. The RP's job is to support the teachers conducting the ACP and ensure that:

- The school has allotted a dedicated period in the time table for conduction of program.
- The school/teachers have program content (CDs and facilitation manual) to run the class.
- · The teachers use the correct methodology taught in training.

Understanding and practicing facilitation techniques is an integral part of the program. These techniques enable the students to discover their potential within. The techniques include, acknowledging each student's views without being judgmental. It also includes the students' learning from peers rather than from the facilitator.

The RP observes the class being conducted by the trained teachers and interacts with the students and teachers to understand whether the values of the program have enriched their outlook and whether they find any positive behavioural changes in themselves. In no circumstance does an RP act as an inspector or examiner. Rather, RPs aim to hand hold teachers and reduce their burden. Consequently, the feedback we receive is extremely encouraging and motivates us to go to remote schools despite huge logistical challenges. This free offering of Ramakrishna Mission Delhi-Gurugram, has been lauded repeatedly by teachers, principals, government authorities, parents and children. The demand for ACP in more and more schools has to be met. Hence, committed resource persons/donors who are interested in contributing towards this program may contact us at the email address given below.
